SERVICE PROJECT SHEET Rotary Aquabox



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Project name:

Aquabox. Administered by the Rotary Club of Wirksworth under the Registered Charitable Company "Aquabox". (Registered Charity 04774277)

Project goal:

To provide in the wake of both man-made and natural disasters a rapid response provision of safe drinking water and welfare aid items.

Rotary service type:

Can involve funding only, organised collections or a combination of both within clubs or in joint participation with local community groups (e.g. schools, churches, youth groups etc.).

Unique selling proposition:

An inexpensive (under 1p per litre) easily transported and simple to operate method of purifying and providing safe drinking water thus helping to minimise the outbreak of disease.

Description:

Standard AQUABOX: Costs £50 and comprises the container (approximately 600x400x400) of 75 litre capacity, provided with 4 survival bags, 1 large box liner to protect goods from water damage, 1 filter and tap, 1 pack of 14 pre-packed pairs of bespoke water purification tablets being sufficient to supply 1100 litres of purified water (75x14) and filling, dispatch and return instructions. It is designed for Rotary Clubs, Inner Wheel Clubs, churches, schools, youth organisations and other community groups to fill with added welfare aid items – as identified on the Aquabox brochure/order form but excludes foodstuffs (to avoid sell-by date problems), drugs and medicines.

Boxes are available on request using the official order form and the cost includes the cost of delivery to you and return to the Aquabox depot at Wirksworth to await call-off by Aid Agencies.

DONATIONS can be made for discretionary allocation or specifically to sponsor Aquaboxes to be filled by some other club or organisation. A donation of £30 sponsors a box to be filled by someone else arranged by Aquabox. Boxes sponsored by other clubs and organisations are frequently available, with no charge for the box and contents, although a payment of £15 is required for transportation costs. "Free" boxes may, from time to time, be available with no transportation costs if collected and returned to the Aquabox depot by the "filling" organisation.

AQUABOX 30: Costs £250 and comprises one container, as for the Standard box, but is filled at the Aquabox depot with 30 filters, taps and 30 sets of purification tablets. These boxes are **not sent to sponsors** but are held at the Aquabox depot to await call off by Aid Agencies to back up Standard welfare boxes already in use overseas and also for immediate dispatch following any natural disaster such as earthquake, hurricane, etc.

Every Aquabox is uniquely numbered enabling each sponsor or filler, on a 'trackback' basis, to know the ultimate destination of their box. The insertion of a personal note by the sender is encouraged and any "feedback" received would be welcomed if forwarded to the Rotary Club of Wirksworth.

All returned filled boxes are checked that everything is tightly packed inside the plastic liner provided for protection and to avoid damage by movement inside the box when in transit.

Background:

Launched in 1992 by the Rotary Club of Wirksworth in Derbyshire, the Aquabox project is administered by the Registered Charitable Company "Aquabox" having formerly, from inception,

been managed by the BARRIE GRIFFITHS ROTARY TRUST named in memory of one of its former members and DG Elect, Rotarian Barrie Griffiths. It has provided some 35,000 Aquaboxes to over 30 countries. Its enormous and sustained growth between 1998/99 was as direct result of the 'Hurricane Mitch' initiative when over 1000 boxes capable of purifying in excess of 22 million litres were shipped from the UK in under 3 months thanks to over £230,000 raised within RIBI. Though the project remains a stand-alone operation administered by the Directors and members of the Aquabox Company, all of whom MUST be members of the Rotary Club of Wirksworth, there is growing and active support from other clubs, Inner Wheel clubs, churches, WIs, schools and youth organisations and individual Rotarians both from within D.1220 and further a field. The first parallel project has now been launched by the Rotary Club of Eltham, Victoria, Australia.

Benefits to the club:

Aquabox can be a simple and inexpensive project involving club members in 'hands-on service' and offers an ideal opportunity to involve and forge links with the many community groups and others in your area.
